Message From Executive Director

As downtown Chattanooga continues to evolve from the prepandemic level of office workers and conventioneers, the Downtown Chattanooga Alliance and its partners work hard to attar new businesses, create more housing, rethink the use of large corporate campuses, and bring in large events. Competition from new and shiny developments in other parts of the city will certainly draw interest from businesses and residents. However, downtown has several key components that other areas will struggle to replicate. The Tennessee River, downtown parks, attractions, retail, restaurants, and ease of access from the highway system allow downtown a natural choice to live, work and play.

During the month of September, downtown hosted several large events like IRONMAN Chattanooga and the 3 Sisters Festival that drew thousands of visitors. New restaurants and businesses opened in downtown like Wooden City. Steam Logistics continued its revitalization efforts in John Ross Landing area and will soon move hundreds of employees into a formally vacant building. Noon Development has transformed the building at 715 Market Street that will soon bring more employees to the downtown area. Plans are in the works for the redevelopment of the building at 736 Broad Street, known as the Old Chattanooga Bank, to begin in Q1 or Q2 of 2023.

The DCA is in place to help protect business investments, work on challenges, and improve conditions. With a strong group of property owners, businesses and residents, support from the Mayor's Office, CPD, and community partners, downtown will remain a place people continue to choose to live, work, and enjoy special events.

With the weather nearly perfect during September and much of October, residents and visitors packed the downtown area. Restaurant patios were full, people utilized the bike share program, and there was a general sense of enjoyment throughout the district. Ambassadors received many compliments for the service they provided. Visitors commented on how clean downtown had become and pointed out the blooming flowers in the hanging baskets and ground planters.

Competition from other areas of Chattanooga is healthy, and new developments will always draw interest. However, downtown will continue to be THE place to be, and the DCA is in place to help keep it that way.






Executive Summary: Clean Team Highlights, September 2022

Accomplishments

During the month of September, Downtown Chattanooga Alliance Ambassadors achieved the following special projects and cleaning accomplishments.

- 1. Power washed stains, smells, and deep cleaned sidewalks for 46 hours a decrease of 8% when compared to August 2022.
- 2. Removed 152 graffiti tags and stickers observed around the district a decrease of 11% when compared to August 2022.
- 3. Cleaned 83 biohazards and disinfected the immediate surrounding area, a decrease of 17% when compared to August 2022.
- 4. Collected 1672 bags of trash, an increase of 12% when compared to August 2022.
- 5. Performed weed abatement on 117 block faces, an increase of 14% when compared to August 2022.
- 6. Cleaned 455 trash cans, and decrease of 15% when compared to August 2022.

- 1. Provided 3,358 directions and recommendations an increase of 22% when compared to August 2022.
- 2. Conducted 147 business checks, an increase 10% when compared to August 2022.
- 3. Provided 3 motorist assists, a decrease of 73% when compared to August 2022.
